

TNR (Trap-Neuter-Return) Guidelines

What is a feral cat?

A feral cat is one who lives outside as a part of a colony, it cannot be handled by humans and it **does not** have an owner.

What is the TNR Program?

The TNR program is for feral cats to be spayed and neutered. TNR stands for (Trap-Neuter-Return). Upon spay/neuter all cats will be altered and provided with rabies and FVRCP vaccinations. All cats will be ear-tipped as well.

Is this for my house cat?

No. This program is not for friendly, stray, outside cats who have an owner.

**Surgery Days are Mondays and Wednesdays
ALL cats must be dropped off between 7:00am-8:30am**

**Limit of TWO cats per day unless otherwise approved.
Drop off location is:

What is required at drop off:

- Feral cats must be over 3 lbs. or 3.5 months of age.
- Feral cats must arrive in humane traps covered with a sheet or towel (other containers will not be accepted)
- Feral cats must be dropped off with an empty, clean, medium size plastic carrier with a towel inside

Do not transport cats in the trunk of your car. Drop off crates must be in good condition with bolts attached to prevent escape.

What is required after spay/neuter:

- Keep cat in covered carrier for 24 hours before release with food and water
- Return cat to trap location
